

# Proclamation

**Whereas**, Alpha-1-Antitrypsin Deficiency is a serious genetic disorder associated with liver disease in infants, children, and adults, and lung disease in young adults; and

**Whereas**, Alpha-1-Antitrypsin Deficiency is the most common genetic disease for which liver transplants are performed in newborns; and

**Whereas**, one in thirty-seven people carry the gene for Alpha-1-Antitrypsin Deficiency; and

**Whereas**, 80,000 to 100,000 Americans are estimated to have severe Alpha-1-Antitrypsin Deficiency, and 20 million more are thought to be affected with a milder deficiency; and

**Whereas**, Alpha-1-Antitrypsin Deficiency was only identified in 1963 and is often misdiagnosed and under diagnosed; and

**Whereas**, a need has been identified to increase awareness and detection of this disorder;

**Now, therefore, I, Mary Fallin, Governor**, do hereby proclaim the month of November 2015, as
