

Proclamation

Whereas, Complex Regional Pain Syndrome (CRPS), also known as Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy (RSD), is a rare neurological disorder that causes chronic pain; and

Whereas, the symptoms of CRPS are often described as a burning sensation that is out of proportion to the severity of the initial injury and can include swelling and extreme sensitivity to the touch; and

Whereas, CRPS/RSD can occur after an injury or trauma to the affected area of the body. The cause of CRPS/RSD is unknown and there is no cure, but treatment can help relieve painful symptoms; and

Whereas, the National Institute of Neurological Disorder and Stroke (NINDS) are studying new approaches for treating CRPS/RSD and intervening more aggressively after a traumatic injury in an effort to limit the symptoms and disability associated with this condition; and

Whereas, on November 2, 2015, members of the CRPS community will be celebrating the second annual "Color the World Orange Day" to increase awareness of this poorly understood pain disorder,

Now, therefore, I, Mary Fallin, Governor, do hereby proclaim November 2015 as

"Complex Regional Pain Syndrome Awareness Month"

in the State of Oklahoma.
